I found Anita to be outspoken and brave, very intelligent, funny, great story teller (about her life in Michigan and during her travels), excellent writer and very personable to everyone, I always enjoyed hearing what stories and issues she was working on for the newspapers. In her reporting for Sun Times, she had interviewed us for an article on "snowbirds" in 2017 as we are in SC only during the winter months. That was when we became better acquainted. We also shared the same views regarding the rights of women and other progressive issues (afraid we were in the minority in SC and at the Temple) and of course our love for food! She would call to tell me about excellent restaurants not well known and where to buy fresh seafood directly from the fisherman and what time to meet him on the corner! She also helped us in other ways - in finding a dog to adopt and with info during the last big hurricane and flooding. Although not in good health in recent years, she attended the DC Women's March, demonstrated in front of certain SC politicians offices, and I also remember her being kicked out of a Surfside town meeting while trying to attend what should have been a "public meeting".
