“As a psychotherapist attending Tuesday Seminars, I knew Natan as a therapist who brilliantly told patients what they needed to hear rather than just what they wanted to hear. I believe that his love was what gave him the courage to do this and continue to be with them and them with him while they came to understand and come to love him in their healing process. I especially enjoyed the topic of one Tuesday - music. A favorite memory from that Tuesday was Natan sharing his poem, honoring his mother, "Sing Your Song To Me." He read it to us and I spoke to him later suggesting he tell his son, Michael, to put it to music. He smiled and said that he would think about it. The poem was included in the publication of VOICES, volume 42, Number 2, Summer of 2006:

"Even though music is everywhere we can't always hear it. Music resides both outside and inside each of us. It is much more difficult to hear the music which is within us than the music which surrounds us. Most People rarely hear it. But when a person's outside music resonates with his inside music what he hears is a chord from the original creation.
